- E.g. Our house goes back to (= has existed since) the 18th century.

2. To have butterflies (in your stomach) informal

To feel very nervous, usually about something you are going to do

E.g. I had terrible butterflies before I gave that talk in Venice.

3. Apprehensive

Feeling worried about something that you are going to do

E.g. I'm a bit apprehensive about tomorrow's meeting.

4. Can't get/wrap your head around

If you say that you can't get your head around something, you mean that you cannot understand it

E.g. I just can't get my head around these tax forms.

5. Tremendously

Tremendous (adjective)

very great in amount or level, or extremely good

E.g. They were making the most tremendous amount of noise last night.

E.g. She's been a tremendous (= very great) help to me over the last few months.

E.g. You won? That's tremendous!

Tremendously (adverb) We all enjoyed ourselves tremendously.

6. To stand out

To be very noticeable

E.g. The black lettering really stands out on that orange background.

7. Excruciating

Extremely boring or embarrassing

- E.g. excruciating boredom
- E.g. His confession, when it came, was excruciating.

8. Heartwarming

Adjective (especially of an event, action or story) seeming to be something positive and good and therefore causing feelings of pleasure and happiness

E.g. a heartwarming tale of triumph over adversity

9. Exquisite

describes feelings such as pleasure or pain that are extremely strong, or qualities that are extremely good;

- E.g. Great exquisite joy
- E.g. The pain was quite exquisite.
- E.g. A vase of exquisite workmanship
- E.g. A good comedian needs to have an exquisite sense of timing.
