2. cringe

To feel embarrassed by something you have said or done because you think it makes you seem silly

She cringed at the sound of her own voice.

It makes me cringe when I think how stupid I was.

3. Decrepit (adj)

In bad condition:

The buildings were in a decrepit state.

He was a rather decrepit old man.

Decrepitude noun [uncountable]

4. The best case scenario (=the best thing that might happen)

5. A hitch

A small problem that makes something difficult or delays it for a short time Technical/slight/last-minute hitch

In spite of some technical hitches, the first program was a success.

The whole show went without a hitch.

6. Credo

A formal statement of the beliefs of a particular person, group, religion etc.

American Express is emphasizing its 'the customer is first' credo.

7. fella

A man

There is a fella outside who wants to see you.

8. fried

Unable to think clearly, because you are tired, anxious etc.:

My brain is just totally fried.

9. Pull over

To drive to the side of the road and stop your car, or to make someone else do this:

The policeman signaled to him to pull over.

Pull somebody/something over

He pulled the car over.

A cop pulled him over and gave him a speeding ticket.

10.Stuffy

A room or building that is stuffy does not have enough fresh air in it:

It is getting stuffy in here – do you mind if I open the window?

11.have/take a spill

To have a fall; to tip over.

12.Sprain

To damage a joint in your body by suddenly twisting it

SYN twist

I fell down the steps and sprained my ankle.

13. Not know someone from Adam

KNOW SB informal

To not know someone at all

14.budge

To change one's opinion or stated position; yield:

Once her father had said "no," he wouldn't budge.

15.prick (up) your ears

LISTEN

If you prick up your ears or your ears prick up, you listen carefully because you have heard something interesting

Jay pricked up his ears when I mentioned a vacation.

16. Ham-fisted

Not at all skillful or careful in the way that you deal with people

SYN inept

They made several ham-fisted attempts to spy on her.

CLUMSY/not at all skillful with your hands SYN clumsy
