6. Loaded

very rich: Giles can afford it - he's loaded.

7. a plan that will **fly** will be successful and useful: News is that the plan for the new hotel isn't going to fly.

8. A fiasco

an event that is completely unsuccessful, in a way that is very embarrassing or disappointing SYN disaster: The first lecture I ever gave was a complete fiasco.

9. Have second thoughts

a change of opinion or resolve reached after considering something again. "on second thoughts, perhaps he was right"

10. Tenacious

determined to do something and unwilling to stop trying even when the situation becomes difficult: a tenacious negotiator

11. Crave

to have an extremely strong desire for something: an insecure child who craves attention

12. Linger on

to stay somewhere a little longer, especially because you do not want to leave

13. a wee bit

LITTLE/NOT VERY to a small degree: She looked a wee bit confused.

14. Metastasize

to spread or grow

15. every/any Tom, Dick and Harry

anyone at all, used especially when you mean that something should be done only by particular people, not by everyone: You can't expect him to tell every Tom, Dick and Harry what he earns, can you?

16. have something at your/their

to have knowledge or information ready and available to use very easily: We have all the facts and figures at our fingertips.

17. get off the ground

SUCCESSFUL to start to be successful: Her show never really got off the ground in the UK.

to be in a highly favorable situation

19. all duck or no dinner

Of a situation, action, or effort resulting in either total success or total failure; all or nothing. We've got one last chance to secure an investor for the company, so it's all duck or no dinner with this meeting!
